Coronavirus Bulletin

Dear Parents and Carers,

LFD testing has gone very smoothly and to date we have completed 2324 tests in the past two weeks and no positives or voids! Students have been very sensible and respectful throughout this whole process and our staff in the Testing Centre are amazing!

We are now moving to home testing and have produced some documentation which I would ask that you read regarding this if you haven't already. It can be found on our website at:

Test and Trace Support Payments

Parents and carers of children who have been advised to self-isolate by their education setting or by NHS Test and Trace are now able to apply for a <u>Test and Trace Support Payment</u> or discretionary payment of £500, if they meet the eligibility criteria. The extension of the Test and Trace Support Payment scheme, which is administered by district and unitary local authorities in England, ensures that parents receive the financial support they need if they are unable to attend work due to childcare responsibilities.

Parents and carers should apply to their **local authority** to receive a payment. Applications for the Test and Trace Support Payment scheme are made via the **local authority in which the parent or carer resides**, not the local authority where the setting is situated, if these are different.

To be eligible applicants must meet all of the criteria that:

- They are the parent or guardian of a child or young person in the same household and need to take time off work to care for them while they self-isolate. This is limited to one parent or guardian per household for the child or young person's self-isolation period.
- They are employed or self-employed.
- They cannot work from home while undertaking caring responsibilities and will lose income as a result.



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 They meet all the other means-tested eligibility criteria for a Test and Trace Support Payment or locally determined criteria for a discretionary payment.

And that the child or young person:

- Is aged 15 or under (or 25 or under with an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP)) and normally attends an education or childcare setting.
- Has been told to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace or by their education or childcare setting because they have been identified as a close contact of someone who has tested positive for coronavirus (COVID-19).

If your child has been identified by school as someone who needs to self-isolate, we will provide you with a letter to that effect. The letter will be required should you wish to make a claim for payment.

Once an application for a payment has been received, the **local authority** will be in touch with **our school** to verify the details of the child provided on the application. This will include a check of the child's name, age, address and days of self-isolation. This check is to minimise the event of fraudulent claims. It may be conducted before or after a payment is made, depending on the arrangements the individual local authority has chosen to put in place.

Punctuality

It's really important that your child attends school every day if they are well. It's also crucial that they arrive on time. As mentioned in last week's bulletin, we have now started sending out emails to you to advise that your child was late to school. If your child had a medical appointment or the school bus was late, you will not have received this email.

Please can I urge you to discuss your child's punctuality with them on the back of this email? If they are late, they are missing part of their first lesson and will need to catch-up on the work missed – in some cases this will mean missing their breaks and lunchtimes to complete the missed work.

If you know your child is going to be late, please let school know immediately. There are <u>safeguarding concerns</u> for us as a school if your child does not arrive on time.

We have put a new system in place to monitor and deal with poor punctuality which involves an after-school (Period 6) detention for one hour on a Friday. This is a non-negotiable day/time and will be staffed by a member of SLT. Students will be asked to complete work they have missed/home-learning in silence and no phones will be allowed. Students





must make their own way home after this detention. We ask that you support us with our aims to ensure all students attend school and attend school **on time**.

If a student is in school but chooses not to attend detention and absconds, this is again, a <u>safeguarding concern</u> for us as parents/carers will not know where they are. Safeguarding concerns will always be flagged up with our Designated Safeguarding Leads.

New Toilets

If you were to ask your child to name one of the areas of school most in need of a facelift, they will undoubtedly say "The Red Room!"

This was a most unwelcoming space with a lack of purpose and greatly in need of some TLC! Space is severely lacking in school as you know, so it was important we made best use of it. Here are some photos of the room as it was before:

The lack of toilets was a big concern, largely due to the closure of the English block but also as we had to bring in a mobile toilet block to meet our Covid H&S regulations. We now have a large, open-plan toilet block and a new classroom!

The toilets will be used by students in Years 8 and 9 in the first instance, as they are located in their bubbles' zone. The boys' toilets opposite will be refurbished as part of the English Centre build but they are fully functional and in good repair at the moment.
