A Level Law at a glance:

- **The legal system** including the civil and criminal courts, sentencing and legal personnel
- **Law making** including the role of parliament, judicial law making and delegated legislation
- **Criminal Law** including murder, property offences, offences against the person and defences
- **Tort Law** including negligence, occupiers' liability, vicarious liability and remedies
- **The Nature of Law** including law and morality, law and justice, and law and society
- **Contract Law** including formation and terms of a contract, discharge and remedies

Assessment

A-level Law is assessed in the final year of study by written examinations. This involves three exam papers, each two hours long. Students will be required to answer essay questions and apply the law to scenario questions.

Entry requirements

Whilst we prefer students to have a grade 6 in GCSE English Language

You must be enthusiastic, have a questioning mind and a genuine interest in legal issues and current affairs.

What subjects work well with Law?

A level Law is a well-respected subject which enables student to develop a range of transferable skills including essay writing, problem solving and the ability to produce balanced arguments. A- level law works well with most subjects.
